COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The course studies the Theology of the Church. It is divided into two main sections: The Church Viewed from Outside (Apologetics) and The Church Viewed from Inside (Dogma). Section I provides an apologetic defense of the Catholic Church: its founding, nature, properties, marks, perpetuity, and its role as the rule of Faith. Section II enters into a dogmatic understanding of the Church. It covers the following topics: the nature of the Church as the Mystical Body of Christ, membership of the Church, the necessity of belonging to the Church, the role of the Roman Pontiff, the role of Bishops, the relationship between Church and State.

PURPOSE:

This course is designed to give the students:

- the ability to defend their Faith in the divine institution of the visible Catholic Church;
- a knowledge of the Church's classic ecclesiology, seen it in its sources, its theological principles, its Magisterial expression, and its practical implications;
- an initial exposure to the new ecclesiology that was promoted at and after the Second Vatican Council;
- a secure foundation for forming their own critique of the changing paradigms in Catholic Ecclesiology, especially as regards the relationship between Church and State.

QUIZZES, TESTS, AND WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS:

Quizzes may throughout the course. They will be announced. Any quiz missed without a legitimate excuse may not be made up. Quizzes missed with a legitimate excuse must be made up within one week. It is the responsibility of the student to inform the instructor that a quiz was missed, explain the reason, and schedule a make-up quiz if possible. At the end of the semester, each student's lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

There will be either one or two tests in addition to the semester final. The policy for making-up a missed test is the same for missed quizzes except that **only for a very serious reason** will the instructor permit a make-up test. Normally, a formally-excused absence or a doctor's note will be necessary.

Written assignments to be completed outside of class as homework will be assigned throughout the semester. This includes at least one major essay during the course of the semester. The purpose of this work is to check the students' deeper understanding of the material, and to monitor his/her comprehension of their readings.

If it is obvious to the teacher that a student has used voice-recognition technology rather than writing his / her coursework submission, he reserves the right to give a **failing grade**, irrespective of the understanding that may be demonstrated.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Attendance at each lecture is considered mandatory. A student with five or more absences without previously-granted permission will risk a grade-reduction or loss of credit for the course at the discretion of the instructor. After ten unexcused absenses may stand to fail the course.

INCOMPLETE WORK:

Assigned work that is not handed in will be given a "0". Assigned work that is tardy may suffer a 10% grade reduction for each day that the assignment is late.

CLASS PARTICIPATION:

Successful learning occurs only when the student is actively focused on the class lectures and discussions. It is the student's responsibility to assimilate new material, to synthesize it with previous material, and to see to it that any gaps in his/her understanding be recognized and resolved. Therefore, students are strongly encouraged to ask questions pertinent to the topic presented and to participate in class discussions.

If students find special difficulties with the material or any portion of it, they should not hesitate to email or arrange a meeting with the teacher, who – since he wants nothing more than that they truly understand and profit by the class – will strive to help them in assimilating the matter to the extent possible. Ideally this should be done more than a week before the test or final exam.
